Holes

Louis Sachar is an American author who has written many books for children. 'Holes' is one of his most popular novels. It tells the story of Stanley, a boy cursed with bad luck. Due to a series of unfortunate events, Stanley finds himself at Camp Green Lake Juvenile Detention Centre.

There is no lake at Camp Green Lake. There was once a very large lake here, the largest lake in Texas. That was over a hundred years ago. Now it is just dry, flat wasteland.

There used to be a town of Green Lake as well. The town shrivelled and dried up along with the lake and the people who lived there.

During the summer, the daytime temperature hovers around ninety-five degrees in the shade – if you can find any shade. There's not much shade in dry lake.

The only trees are two old oaks on the eastern edge of the 'lake'. A hammock is stretched between the two trees and a log cabin stands behind that.

The campers are forbidden to lie in the hammock. It belongs to the warden. The warden owns the shade. Out on the lake, rattlesnakes and scorpions find shade under rocks and in the holes dug by the campers. Here's a good rule to remember about rattlesnakes and scorpions: If you don't bother them, they won't bother you.

Usually.

Being bitten by a scorpion or even a rattlesnake is not the worst thing that can happen to you. You won't die.

Usually.

Sometimes a camper will try to be bitten by a scorpion or even a small rattlesnake. Then he will spend a day or two recovering in his tent, instead of having to dig a hole out on the lake.

But you don't want to be bitten by a yellow-spotted lizard. That's the worst thing that can happen to you. You will die a slow and painful death.

Always.

If you get bitten by a yellow-spotted lizard, you might as well go into the shade of the oak trees and lie in the hammock.

There is nothing anyone can do to you anymore.

- 5) Identify one technique that Louis Sachar uses to make the reader want to read more. (1 mark)
- 6) Then boys at Camp Green Lake have been sent there as a punishment for bad behaviour. Do you think digging holes on the lake is a suitable punishment? Explain your answer. (2 marks)



Today is going over the learning from Friday where we were finding percentage of a quantity. Let me recap the two methods we used last time, which I have taken from Friday's lesson to guide you.

For the guidance below take yourself back to question 1 and Friday's video to guide you.

Method 1 shows us how to draw a model to help us answer the question, to then understand the total number of seats is 100% and to then proceed to follow the method by understanding that dividing the 400 seats by the 100 seats (total number of seats \div the 100%) will give us the 1% which equals 4 seats. Then as we know that 60% of the seats on the plane were economy class and that we are looking for the number of seats that 60 represents so by multiplying the 4 (1% of the seats) by the 60 (the % we are looking for) we will find the total number of seats in economy is 240.

Method 2 looks at the 'part of the whole concept' (how many percent of the whole) by us knowing that 60% of 400 is 60/100 x 400 and by cancelling the zeroes from the 100 and then the zeroes from the 400 we are left with 60 x 4 which equals 240. Again we discover that there are 240 seats in economy class.
